ANALYSIS: 1. Isaiah was a prophet to and its capital city of

THINGS TO THINK ABOUT:

The people of Judah and Jerusalem were called by God to confess and forsake specifically named sins. If they were willing to listen to the LORD through His prophet and obey, they would prosper. Likewise, if they refused to hear the LORD's prophet Isaiah and continued to rebel, then they would be devoured with the sword. The total destruction of Jerusalem some years later by Nebuchadnezzar tells us they made the wrong choice.

Have you considered the application that all our outward expressions of worship (attending church, taking part in services, helping, and even praying) are not accepted by our God, if we are holding unconfessed sin?

Whenever the LORD convicts us of a sin or duty, let us immediately be "willing and obedient" (v.19) to honor and obey Him.

HELP:

- 1. Judah, Jerusalem (v.1).
- 2. Rebelled, doth not know, doth not consider, sinful, laden with iniquity, evildoers, corrupters, forsaken the LORD, provoked, backward, revolt, sick, faint, no soundness, wounds, bruises, putrefying sores, not been closed, neither bound up, neither mollified with ointment (vs.2-6).
