THINGS TO THINK ABOUT:

Judah had turned away from the LORD who had given them so much, to other gods who had given them nothing. In their backslidings they proudly boasted, "we are lords," and showed their spiritual blindness by claiming, "I have not sinned." One sin, unconfessed, easily leads to a pathetic shameless multiplication of sins. Even chastening may fail to bring restoration (I Cor 11:30).

At the first consciousness of even the temptation to sin, let us humbly confess the sin, repent of and forsake all that is involved in drawing us into the sin, and "draw nigh to God and He will draw near to you [us]" (Jam 5:8).
