What are you proud about today? What have you done that you think is pretty special? Humble yourself under the mighty hand of God. Take time right now to bless and praise the Lord for his goodness toward you and for all the blessings he has so mercifully showered upon you. The LORD hates pride, but he loves thanksgiving.

*See page 144 in Halley's Bible Handbook. Belshazzar ruled Babylon with his father Nabonidus the son of Nebuchadnezzar. This helps explain how Daniel could be "third ruler" in the kingdom (vs 16, 29).

HELP:

- 1. When he saw just the hand of a man write some words in the plaster of the wall of the king's palace (v 5).
- 2. The queen (v 10).
- 3. He flatly refused the gifts and promotion (v 17).
- 4. He reviewed the life of Nebuchadnezzar, Belshazzar's grandfather (vv 18-22).
- 5. Failure to humble himself though he knew about God's judgment on his grandfather Nebuchadnezzar, lifting up himself against the Lord of heaven, drinking wine from the vessels from God's house, praising the gods of gold, silver, brass, iron, wood and stone, ignoring and not praising the God in whose hand his breath was (vs 22-23).
